Message from Headteacher

The field has not had as much use as we would have liked this week, with the rain doing its best to remind us that summer in England should never be taken for granted. However, when it has been open, it has been lovely to see how much the students enjoy the space. Some of the old games are still clearly the best ones. Among the various footballs, tennis balls and general running around, earlier in the week I even spotted a group of students doing the Hokey Cokey. Properly, too. Hands joined, foot in, foot out, full commitment. I will spare them the embarrassment of naming names, but they know who they are. I was tempted to join in, of course, but decided the students were managing perfectly well without me.

There is something very pleasing about seeing students make their own fun in such a simple way. No equipment, no screen, no great planning needed; just a group of students enjoying each other's company and not worrying too much about looking silly. That is not a bad skill to hold on to.

I also had the pleasure of joining the Year 8 assembly this week, where Mrs Evans had invited six Year 9 students, Danny, Ethan, Millie, Peyton, Flavia and Mya, to speak about their experience of moving from Year 8 into Year 9. They spoke with real confidence and offered thoughtful insight into what that transition can feel like.

I was particularly impressed by the honesty of what they shared. They recognised that moving into Year 9 can feel a little nerve-wracking at first, but also talked about how important it is to get to know new people, work with others you have not worked with before, and be open to the opportunities that come from that. It was a lovely example of students helping other students, and I am very grateful to them for doing it. Speaking in front of so many people is pretty daunting for most. I am not sure I would have been quite so willing, or quite so composed, when I was in Year 9, which, I am reliably informed, was some time ago.



That idea of transition is very much on our minds at this time of year. On Thursday next week, we will welcome prospective Year 7 students and families to our Open Evening. In my time at BGS, we have not previously had formal Headteacher presentations as part of Open Evening, but this year I will be giving three short talks across the night.

Even better, Elwood and Izzy from Year 7 will also be speaking, sharing their own experiences of joining the School. I think that student voice matters enormously, especially in moments like this. Adults can explain systems, routines and expectations, but students are often best placed to describe what it actually feels like to make that move. For our primary school visitors, hearing from students who were in their position only a year ago will, I hope, be both helpful and reassuring.

Copenhagen Trip 2026

Day 1

Tired at 2am on Tuesday, a group of biologists and chemists set off from school to Heathrow airport, en route to Copenhagen. After a short flight, we reached Copenhagen airport. Despite the minor setback of a lost bag (not so minor to James), we started our tour of the city and took the exceptional city metro to the Round Tower. Nearby, we grabbed a quick lunch before commencing an insightful science walking tour, exploring the different scientists from Denmark, who had studied and researched in the very area we walked. Alongside learning about different scientists and their contributions to international science, we were able to see the University of Copenhagen and the beautiful, colourful streets surrounding the university.

Afterwards, we climbed the Round Tower (Rundetårn). Originally built as an astronomical observatory, it is well-known for its equestrian staircase that leads to stunning views over Copenhagen. We all spent time well, soaking in the views of Copenhagen and taking pictures of the skyline.

Later, we walked to the Museum of Illusions, which in short, is as peculiar as the name suggests. There were a huge host of photo spots, that look completely normal at first, but once looking through the lens the illusion becomes very real. After exploring and enjoying the many illusions, we had our dinner in nearby restaurants and finally checked in to the hostel. Apart from an ant infestation scare in one of our rooms (which had a very lucky solution), we had a very relaxing end to our long day.



Day 2

After such a jam-packed first day, the second felt much more relaxed. First up, the Planetarium, and what an interesting place it was! After a short, guided tour of the technology used in space exploration, we were left to our own devices to look around the rest of the exhibits. The best one by far was the Cosmos exhibit, full of beautiful visuals, and interactive technology. After this, we were then ushered into the planetarium dome, for a screening of 'Touch the stars' and 'The unseen world'.

Next up, after a short walk, was the Tivoli theme park. We were allocated a generous amount of time to have fun, and we definitely made the most of it! Despite the unfortunate weather, we still had a great time, with fantastic rides, delicious food, and many memories. Props to the teachers for braving the Golden Tower, a 63-metre free fall plunge! I'm sure Dr Hanson would love to go again.

After this, was the slightly less exciting, but still very interesting, Home of Carlsberg (place of the invention of the pH scale and the 2022 Chemistry Nobel prize). Full of the history of Carlsberg, as well as interactive games, somehow, they managed to make a museum actually engaging. As a bonus, at the very end of our self-guided tour, we even received a free (soft) drink of choice and enjoyed some time in the relaxing bar area.

What a day! It certainly was fun, and after the group split for dinner, we felt happy, knowing there were still two more days left of our trip.

Day 3

On the third day, we left the hostel early and travelled by metro to visit the Medical Museum. The museum was extremely interesting and gave us an insight into the history of medicine and healthcare in Europe. We saw many preserved foetuses, organs, and medical specimens, which were both fascinating and shocking to look at. We also learnt about how doctors used to diagnose and treat diseases before the development of modern medicine and technology. It was interesting to see how much medical knowledge and treatment methods have evolved over time, especially compared to the advanced healthcare systems we have today.

After visiting the museum, we walked to the Botanical Gardens near Rosenborg Castle. When we arrived, it was raining heavily and everyone got completely soaked walking there. Luckily, by the time we reached the gardens, the rain had stopped and the sun came out, creating a beautiful atmosphere. Everyone split off into smaller groups to explore the gardens, while some people also ventured to look around Rosenborg Castle. Walking through the gardens felt like a fairytale.

After lunch, we visited the Experimentarium, where everyone had lots of fun trying out the interactive games and activities while also learning about science and the world around us. There were also lots of bubbles. Mr Marsden even managed to achieve a new high score on one of the memory games!

For dinner, we went to Kongens Nytorv, where everyone split up again to eat at different restaurants and do some shopping. The highlight of the evening was seeing Copenhagen's famous colourful houses along the canal at Nyhavn. The bright evening sky, the relaxing atmosphere, and the smell of food from the nearby restaurants made it a perfect end to the day.



Day 4

After three amazing days in Copenhagen, we all knew the end of the trip was near. Once again, we checked out early and took the metro to the vast Copenhagen Zoo. From the savannah to the arctic, the zoo had it all! We spent a couple of hours seeing the biodiversity of the zoo and ate our lunch amongst the animals. At around midday, we left the zoo for the airport in bittersweet feels, all so happy and swamped with memories and experiences. Not knowing the situation at passport control, we rushed to the airport, full of adrenaline, and made it with plenty of time to spare. After a short return flight, we landed back in Heathrow, with a coach welcoming us home.

Thank you so much to the teachers - Dr Hanson, Mr Marsden and Miss Kendrew - who looked after us and organised the trip; I am certain that we all would agree it was such a memorable experience!



Geography GCSE Hunstanton Fieldwork – 3/4/5/8/9/ June 2026

At this time of year, the Geography department takes our Y10 Geographers out to Hunstanton to complete their compulsory fieldwork in preparation for their exams. This physical fieldwork makes up part of the 1st exam paper 'Our Natural World' and students must be ready to discuss their own experiences in collecting data, presenting, analysing, concluding and finally evaluating the project overall. This year, we took 5 groups, over 150 students, to visit Hunstanton and study the extent to which physical processes and human actions are affecting the shape of the coastline. Amelia Giblin & Zac Holmes have written about their experiences.



Once we had all arrived at school, we set off for Hunstanton at around 8am, ready for a busy day of field work. Upon our arrival, we completed our sense of place walk, making the journey from New Hunstanton to Old Hunstanton. We made notes along the way comparing the differences between these two areas.

We then walked back to New Hunstanton and completed our cliff field sketch, noting down evidence of weathering and geomorphic processes as well as the geology of the cliff. After that, we moved onto the beach where some people in each group used ranging poles and clinometers to determine the change of angle of the beach between the cliff and the sea. The remaining people used callipers to sample sediment sizes, gauging the change of rock size as we moved further from the cliff. We then repeated both of these processes in front of a sea wall so that we were able to compare the effects that coastal defences have on a shoreline.



As our final data collection method, we conducted a survey in our groups in which we asked the general public questions about their opinions of Hunstanton and its sea defences. To round off our day of field work, we all then treated ourselves to fish and chips and an ice cream before finally making our way back to Bourne.

Year 12 Design Engineering Trip to Warners Midlands Plc Printers

On the 10 June, the Year 12 Design Engineering students travelled to Warners Midlands PLC Printers in Bourne. This is a family run printing business which has been trading since 1926. It is a fully equipped printing plant that can handle just about every aspect of the magazine and brochure printing process from design through to mailing and dispatch.

Michael Warner met us at the reception. In the conference room he then described the very interesting process of Offset Lithography. Using examples, he went through each step of the process, from the producing of the plates for the printing to how the plates are then used to transfer images onto paper as well as the very impressive environmental credentials of the company.

We were then given a tour of the plant. It was impressive being able to see the different types of printers and the lithographic printers running at very high speeds, allowing the student to visually see the different colours being added at each stage. We were able to see how the giant rolls of paper were prepared and inserted into the machine allowing the printer seamlessly to move from the finished roll to the new one. Michael showed the students in detail the quality check processes involved as well as how the machines stack and sort the magazines or brochures at the end of the process, ready for binding.

This was a very valuable tour; allowing our Design Engineering students to see first-hand the types of machines and processes they will be working with in the future as Engineers. I would like to extend a big thank you to Michael Warner for allowing us to tour the plant.
