THE GREAT GRAMMAR BAKE OFF - Report by Kareish Rajkanna on behalf of the Year 13 Outreach and Activities Committee

Following the reveal that “Don’t Lose Hope” had been chosen by the students as our School charity for the year, plans for the first fundraiser event were underway. The Outreach and Activities Senior Prefect Committee worked with the Head Students and Ms Creedon in order to plan the perfect event that encapsulated the growing festive atmosphere of late November and the creativity and skill of students in all year groups – a Bourne Grammar Bake Off!

Although, having only two weeks to organise the event, the committee managed to promote the Bake Off widely in School with over 100 students showing interest in taking part, as well as holding several meetings to organise the logistics for the day so that the event could run as smoothly as possible. All this hard work and organisation paid off and the day itself was a huge success!

On the morning of Wednesday 23 November, around 40 different cakes and baked treats, all made by students, flooded the Main Hall. These included a wide selection of cakes, cookies, brownies, cupcakes and even pastry turnovers which all incorporated the competition’s theme of ‘Winter’ in the most innovative ways. We were astonished by the quality of all the treats that were brought in, both in appearance and taste.



After the top eighteen entries were chosen based on appearance and relation to the theme, judging took place in the middle of the day by Mrs Ford, Ms Creedon, Mrs Ansell (known to students as Lorraine – Head Chef from the Chill) and representatives of the Head Students and Senior Prefects. Many insightful opinions were bounced back and forth among the expert judges and each entry was scored in four different categories – presentation, link to theme, taste and texture. In the end, after much deliberation and quite frankly sugar overload, the top three cakes were chosen:

First place was taken by Jessy Sayer in 9D and her chocolate cake with black cherry jam. Some of the winning qualities determined by the judges were the superb flavour combinations and the impressive technical detail with the piping and white chocolate decorations, paired with the delicious icing.



Second place was awarded to Emily Simmons in 7C who baked a white chocolate and raspberry cake, which was incredibly creative in incorporating the theme into the bake, even having edible little figurines on a snowy polar cake-scape!



Third place was given to Catie Dawson in 12I who brought in a Danish spice cake. The decoration and taste were both brilliant with one judge saying that it was like “eating a slice of Christmas.”

This was, however, an incredibly difficult decision to make as all of the entries were absolutely fantastic and the scoring of the top six bakes was extremely close.



During lunchtime, the doors to the bake sale were officially open; this led to a cascade of students and staff who were all eager to try the wide array of baked good up for sale. This was all managed in an extremely effective one-way system which made the event as organised as possible. The Christmas songs playing in the background helped add to the bustling and joyful atmosphere in the hall, creating a very memorable afternoon. Almost all the cakes had sold out completely by the end of lunch thanks to the efforts of everyone involved and the generosity (and hunger!) of the students - a truly impressive feat.

At the end, £240.00 was raised, an outstanding BGS communal effort! All the money made will be donated to “Don’t Lose Hope” and we hope that it may help many people in the community who are struggling with their mental health.

We would finally like to thank all of the staff, Head Students and Senior Prefects involved as well as Ms Creedon for organising the event in such a short time period.

We are also extremely grateful for all those who entered this Great Grammar Bake Off, as well as those who bought cake and donated their money to charity.

To those who unfortunately did not have a chance to enter the competition this time round, the Outreach and Activities Committee would like to assure you that we will be planning the return of the Great Grammar Bake Off... watch this space!



INTERNATIONAL SPORTS LAWYER PAYS A VISIT TO BGS – *Report by Mr Mitchell, Law*

BGS A-level Law students had an exciting day last Tuesday when Dev Parmar, Principal Director of Parmars Sports Law firm (<https://www.parmars-sports.com/>) and Global Executive Director of 'International Sports Law' Masters degrees at the world-renowned *Instituto Superior de Derecho y Economía* (ISDE) in Madrid, visited the school to discuss his experiences. Mr Mitchell taught A-level Law to Dev back in 2000 at Kingsbury High School in North West London, and Dev freely gave up his day to support Mr Mitchell's BGS classes twenty years on.

Dev gave a fascinating talk on the importance of defining the word "sport", and the relationship of sport to the law, including an "in a nutshell" summary of the regulatory framework for international legal disputes. He drew attention to the current uncertainty over esports – a billion-dollar industry without a regulatory direction or recognition as a sport. He closed each of the four sessions with a topical case study about a Premiership football player at odds with his club by looking at the standard contractual definition of "gross misconduct" in English law and broader conceptions of "just cause" for terminating a contract in international law.



The students learned a great deal in each session, not only about the nature of sports law but also the jurisdictional problems in settling disputes relating to football. They were enthused by the experience and I received some appreciative student feedback to pass on to Dev.

On a personal note, it is incredibly rewarding to see a former student twenty years beyond the school classroom as a very confident and highly successful practitioner, and I could see many of the students thinking, "where will I be in 20 years' time?". It was an interesting, inspiring and valuable school day for the students. A huge thank you to Dev, and to Mrs Hill, Mrs Ansell and her team (Dev loved the food in The Chill), and everybody who played a part in making this visit a reality.

YEAR 11 ELITE ELEVEN TOURNAMENT – *Report by Madison Mylchreest, Year 11*

On Thursday 24 November eleven Year 11's accompanied by Mr Bower's, participated in the Elite Eleven tournament at Boston College. The tournament tested a range of skills from memory tests, to netball shooting, as well as the teams' individual fitness and physical ability, including an agility run and a series of press-ups and sit-ups. With high expectations due to the previous 4 years of the trophy returning to Bourne Grammar, we attempted all activities with much success.

To begin the day a collective warm-up was held between all 12 schools who attended, which was closely followed by the series of activities. Football targets were first, with the majority of the boys in the team being in the football team, allowing an initial lead being made. The agility run was completed after this, with many beating the previous times that our competitors had set, we had our first team activity, through deduction, teamwork and persistence we managed to complete that activity in the fastest time yet!



Once all the activities had been completed we gathered with all the other schools to listen to an inspirational speech by a local athlete who spoke about how he made it to where he is today as well as his aspirations. Following this the results were announced. With 3rd and 2nd place being tight in points with 106 and 108, we waited nervously to see whether we had made it 5 in a row or if we had failed to make the podium. Mr Bowers, who was more anxious than any of the team, could barely wait for the result to be

announced but relief soon replaced that with 1st place being awarded to us with 120 points. With our water bottles, trophy and day out to Go Ape! We were all extremely happy.

Overall everyone had a great day out and we'd like to thank Boston College again for providing us with such an entertaining day, while testing our skills and fitness.
