This week has been all about the Musical We Will Rock You...and what a fabulous show our students have put on for us! On Monday, Year 6 from Bourne Westfield came to watch the Dress Rehearsal and left the building buzzing with excitement, such was the quality of the music and the overall dramatic performance. The first night on Wednesday went without a hitch, and the cast and crew have thrown themselves headlong into delivering a polished, live musical extravaganza, 26 songs in total played, sung and choreographed.

There will be photographs and a further write up when the run is at an end (the final show is on Saturday evening) but at this mid-point I want to commend all the performers for their efforts, thank the team of staff who have led and facilitated the project and congratulate everyone on the excellence of what has been created. School shows vary enormously in quality, sometimes boosted by the use of professional performers or enhanced by hired costumes or pre built and rented sets. Not so with this show: it is performed entirely by students (minus one keyboard for the Musical Director), has been produced on a minimal budget and the cast list covers the full age range ensuring a fully inclusive opportunity. We are grateful to Steve Jones for sorting out the soundstage for the singers and managing the required AV technology but otherwise it is a home grown production and we should be delighted at the accuracy and energy that runs through every one of those 26 songs. We must also celebrate the fact that over 100 students have joined the team whether they be singers, players, technicians, backstage crew, front of house support, helping with refreshments or any one of the large number of roles that need to be filled to make a production work. We are immensely proud of them all.

With three performances to go – good luck to all involved and I know with absolute certainty that friendships and memories are being cemented. A value cannot be placed on an experience like this.

On Thursday 16 March, the Year 7 netball team set off to Spalding High School to attend their first ever District Tournament. We arrived with cautiously hopeful expectations as the girls had done brilliantly against the league opposition so far however, we were unsure what the teams from the North of the district would be like.

Ably led by Lucy Lord, they warmed up well and were well prepared and motivated for the matches ahead. They were aware that tournament netball is fast-paced and they would need to come out of the blocks quickly. They rose to the challenge and cruised to a 4-0 lead against Giles in their first match, coming away 6-0 victors at the end. This then followed with another 6-0 victory against Spalding High School, where the girls played some really lovely, expansive netball. Our shooters Darcie Trawford, Bea Amos and Imogen Southwood were excellent under the posts, with a special mention to Imogen who typically plays WA for the school. Following this, we continued to build on our good play beating Thomas Cowley 7-0.

In the 4<sup>th</sup> game, Boston High really pushed the girls and had quite a height advantage. This did not perturb the girls with Bri O'Boyle putting a fantastic defensive performance in at Wing Defence to keep them at bay, going into half-time 3-1 up. Flossie Swift and Amelia Giblin worked very well together in the defensive circle, nullifying any attacking opportunities for BHS, allowing us to come away 5-1 winners.

This left the Year 7s with the task of beating local rivals, Bourne Academy, to win the tournament. The students always love this derby and the girls were really pumped up for it! It was a very closely fought game, with both teams playing good competitive netball. Emily Wright-Lakin and Lucy Lord set the tone with excellent work rates that meant we could turnover the ball frequently. This led us to win by 1 goal (3-2) in a tense finish that meant we were crowned District Champions! Well done to the netball team on an excellent season and here's to building on that success next year.



#### SOUTH LINCOLNSHIRE SCHOOLS SUPERZONE U13 GIRLS FUTSAL - Report by Mr Ray, PE

The Under 13 team claimed the title this Wednesday with a comprehensive performance throughout the tournament. The six schools in attendance had an excellent afternoon of football in Boston and the seven strong squad from Bourne Grammar went through the tournament winning all five games.

The first game against hosts Haven High started well, with no goals in the first part of the 10-minute game. Once the deadlock was broken, the girls went on to win with a 3-0 victory. The second game against Spalding High would prove to be the most challenging but the 1-0 victory saw Brooke Olivares-Alvarez keep a second clean sheet with some excellent saves through the game. In their third game against Kirton Middlecott, a slow start eventually opened into a 2-0 lead with Harper Graham controlling midfield and some great footwork and passing from Neve Brackenbury produced a 3-1 win.

The most dominant display against Spalding Academy allowed an increasingly confident team to play faster, attacking football; a delight to watch. Flossie Swift (Year 7) converted probably the best team goal of the day as a result of their flowing passing and movement, sweeping the ball into the corner during this game. At 3-0 we were required to remove one player as per the rules of the day and then at 4-0 a second player was removed, so playing 5 against 3. Honor Moore and Lucy Preston did a superb job for the second half of the game, working hard (despite being so outnumbered) to retain this score-line to the end of the game.

Bourne Academy would be the final opposition in the tournament and the 3-1 victory was secured with another strong performance from Izzy Hughes at the back who was able to stifle so many attacks throughout the five games. The 100% win rate was attained with five impressive wins and seven happy players returning to School at the end of the day. Well done to all the girls on their performances, attitude and approach throughout.

#### THE BRITISH PHYSICS OLYMPIAD – Report by Mr Sutherland, Physics

Each year The British Physics Olympiad runs several competitions designed to stretch and challenge the most able Physicists in the country. This year our high-flying Year 11s were given the opportunity to enter the Intermediate Physics Challenge. We had 36 students who decided to take up the challenge and put

their problem-solving skills to the test. They were against 20 to 30 thousand students internationally; all of whom are considered to be very able.

I think every student who entered this challenge should be proud. The challenge is not designed to be accessible to all, and the students run a real risk of having their confidence knocked. There is a real possibility when entering these challenges that students could be faced with problems that they do not know how to solve, or even how to get started! The level of the challenge is well beyond the level expected nationally of students of this age. The majority of students entering the challenge are used to comfortably scoring well in most assessments they've ever taken – so they were in for a bit of a shock!

All students that sat the one-hour challenge paper found it difficult, as is to be expected. Students were expected to calculate power generated by Gravity Batteries, accounting for the maximum tensile stress of cables used to lift masses. They were expected to calculate the orbital radius of Venus using Kepler's Third Law of planetary motion, and then use data from the transition of Venus across the face of the Sun to calculate its orbital speed; replicating some of the work conducted by Edmund Halley in the 17<sup>th</sup> Century. They did persevere and gave it their best shot. I'm delighted with the outcomes and I think they should be too.

As you can see from the results below all students earned at least a commendation, with the majority making it into the Bronze Certificate level. The two students who earned Silver Certificates were in the top 26% of all entrants. Four of our competitors managed to earn the top level Gold Certificate which placed them in the top 10% of all candidates. An exceptional achievement!

Another well done to all. The Physics Department hope that these entrants choose to continue the subject beyond their GCSEs in Summer.


#### INDIVIDUAL ACHIEVEMENTS
