I would like to start by congratulating a number of Year 8 students for their efforts in recent weeks. I was lucky enough to be asked to judge the finals of the Year 8 Extended Project Competition and was treated to five excellent presentations from five motivated and talented young people. Congratulations to Livvy Bodmer, Charlotte Smith, Arjun Raghavan, Aryan Nahata and Amani Lawal for their very varied and interesting project presentations and to Aryan for being the overall winner. I am delighted to report that Sophie Gombault, also in Year 8, has completed her run, walk, swim and cycle 100km challenge in aid of Macmillan Cancer Support. In total she completed 159km and raised £285 for her efforts. A really impressive display of commitment to a very good cause.

It has also been encouraging to see 20 students in Year 10 and Year 12 complete their Anti-Bullying Ambassador training yesterday through the Diana Award. They will use their training to guide students in lower year groups, continuing to drive the thoughtful, mature culture that is always our aim. An organisation called *The Conversation* was also in School yesterday delivering a workshop to all Year 8 students on Online Safety. This was organised by Mr Baker, our PSHE Lead, and formed part of our ongoing desire to incorporate a range of voices and expertise in equipping our students with all they will need to navigate their futures.

And finally, as a historian, I cannot allow Holocaust Memorial Day to pass without referencing it here. One of the great challenges we face is maintaining the immediacy of memory and the stark reality of significant past events. Mortality mitigates against sustained understanding. I do hope many of our School community paused to remember the horrendous reality of The Holocaust and that we were all able to acknowledge "a day when we light our candles, not only to remember but to continue to drive out darkness and brighten the futures we build for our families, our neighbours, our communities, and our world." ## ACADEMICALLY MORE ABLE: YEAR 8 MINI-EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION Wednesday 26 January 2022 - Report by Dr Barmby, AMA Co-ordinator

During term 2, Year 8 AMA students completed a Mini-Extended Project Qualification, as part of the provision offered to stretch and challenge the School's most academic students. At A-Level, Sixth Form students are able to complete an official Extended Project Qualification to aid their university UCAS applications. Therefore, this opportunity gave the Year 8 students a sneak preview of what the future might hold.

After attending a number of workshops focussing on critical thinking and research skills, students then devised and answered a research question on a topic of their choice. The project encouraged students to discover reliable sources of information, and fostered their analytical and evaluative thinking. The quality of research conducted by the students was outstanding and the range of subjects diverse, demonstrating the wide and varied interests of students within the School. Out of twenty-four students, five finalists were shortlisted to present their projects to Mr Anderson, who judged the winner and two runners-up.

All the projects had been meticulously researched and the students were thoroughly prepared. Public speaking is always a nervy experience, even for those experienced in it. Yet, the students conducted themselves impeccably, speaking with clarity and maturity. In particular, some students had conducted their own experiments and surveys which raised the bar to an even higher standard. Consequently, Aryan Nahata claimed first place with an outstanding study regarding the most air resistant shape. The subsequent data is pictured alongside. Livvy Bodmer and Charlotte Smith both spoke charismatically and answered questions from the audience with great insight. As a result, they received the runners-up prizes. Congratulations to everyone who participated.

#### Report by Aryan Nahata, Year 8:

Recently, Year 8 students from the Academically More Able group were tasked to create a Mini EPQ. An EPQ is a qualification that students choose to do in Sixth Form. We were given four weeks to choose our topics, research about the topics and then present in any format. This was the qualification round. Only five people were chosen amongst the twenty-four who tried.

Those who survived the first round were given around fourteen days to prepare a Powerpoint Presentation to present to Mr Anderson. This was an excitingly nerve-racking experience for all of us. It was a very tough competition, the topics involved were very mature and serious. The topics were: Aerodynamics, Dyson spheres, Qualities of West End Musical Performers, Internalised Racism and the Impact of Exercise on Mental Health. It was an amazing and difficult round. What counted was participation, not winning. The prizes were a £25 Amazon voucher for the winner, and £10 Amazon vouchers for the two runners-up. The runners-up were Charlotte Smith and Livvy Bodmer - the winner was Aryan Nahata.

Thanks to all who participated in the tough competition, Dr Barmby for this unique and amazing experience for all of us, and Mr Anderson for judging our presentations.


