I was privileged this week to be asked to pick a winner from various presentations given by groups of Year 10 students working within a Model Cabinet context, deciding how best to spend £20bn of public money if it was to become available. Electing to represent a major Government department within Cabinet discussions, each group was tasked with putting forward arguments as to why their department should receive the £20bn, how they would spend it and what the positive impacts of that spending would be.

The results were impressive. Each group presented effectively, maintaining strong eye contact with the audience, talking to their chosen visual aids rather than from them, and able to answer probing questions from the floor. Their research was their own, and the good humour and sense of mutual support across the group was palpable. Thanks to Dr Barmby for his work in setting up the activity and well done to Charlotte, Monika and Zoe who represented the need to invest the £20bn into work done by the Department of Energy and Climate so effectively. Perhaps we will indeed see floating solar energy farms on Rutland Water one day...

This is real education in action: a simulation of a real world scenario facing up to real world problems, and requiring students to stand on their own two feet when producing a coherent and reasoned policy platform. This kind of activity requires holistic attributes and skills, and it promotes an independence of thought and action that is highly sought after in the world of work, yet not necessarily reflected in a student's portfolio of public examination results. The best schools have readily available opportunities for this kind of learning and I hope to see many more such examples here at Bourne Grammar. I would also like to encourage our students to respond positively to such opportunities when they become available, and seek out the wider learning opportunities that there are in School. Learning is also as much creative, cultural and physical as it is theoretical and practical, and while the current drive in education is to champion a coherent and sequenced knowledge-based curriculum it is also expected that we offer personal development opportunities that develop confidence and resilience. I would like every student at Bourne Grammar to take part in learning activities that occur alongside the academic curriculum, and those that make the most of such activities will find their lives enriched, and their future prospects enhanced significantly. So...to our students: get involved! Embrace challenge and seek out opportunity. You will benefit hugely by doing so.

## YEAR 10 ACADEMICALLY MORE ABLE: MODEL CABINET REPORT

Over the course of this year, the AMA students in Year 10 have undertaken research in aid of participating in Model Cabinet sessions which emulated the experience of bidding for Government funding. The purpose of these sessions was to offer students an opportunity to engage with the world around them, develop their research skills, and practise their public speaking.

Students were presented with a scenario in which £20bn of public spending was up for grabs. Students worked in small groups to represent different departments, ranging from the Department of Work and Pensions to the Ministry of Defence.

This week marked the culmination of all their hard work and the Model Cabinet sessions were concluded with students presenting their proposals under the scrutiny of the other Cabinet members and the Prime Minister (of BGS - Mr Anderson). Every proposal proved to be thoroughly researched and well argued, with students demonstrating great skill in articulating their arguments and speaking clearly in an engaging manner. Other members of the Cabinet offered probing and thoughtful questions which encouraged students to think on their feet and defend their case.

Mr Anderson generously agreed to judge the proposals, acting as Prime Minister to decide the recipients of the prizes. The winning groups are included below:


#### First Place: Charlotte Alder, Monika Aleksandrova, and Zoe Husbands

As the Department for Energy and the Climate, the students made a compelling case for prioritising the environment and argued convincingly for the economic benefit of investing in green technologies to not only protect the United Kingdom's energy security but also to create jobs and prosperity across the country. It was the way in which the group clearly and effectively set out the links between problems and tangible solutions which made them stand out, in addition to their carefully laid out spending plans.

### Runner-up: Elijah Ford, Charlie Knight, and Miles Cade-Stewart

As the Ministry of Justice, the students presented a forensic statistical breakdown of the evidence to support the nationalisation of all prisons across the United Kingdom to improve efficiency and outcomes for the entire prison system. The group also made a persuasive case for increased investment in the most deprived areas of the country, with the goal of crime prevention. The students were notable for the confidence and clarity of their delivery.
