HOMEWORK AT BOURNE GRAMMAR SCHOOL

Rationale:

At Bourne Grammar School, homework is viewed as a valuable part of a student's learning. We believe that effective homework can reinforce the academic learning undertaken during the day and help our students to develop lifelong skills. Our homework is structured, meaningful and coherent for all concerned – it is not set as an afterthought by teachers, but is instead planned to broaden, consolidate, extend or enhance our students' learning experience.

Our Principles:

- Setting homework is part of the Teachers' Standards and is outlined in the following way: 'Teachers should set homework and plan other out-of-class activities to consolidate and extend the knowledge and understanding pupils have acquired.'
- o Homework should be used to consolidate learning of the curriculum, deepen understanding and prepare pupils for further study in the future.
- Homework develops lifelong skills such as personal organisation, time management, resilience and independence.
- o Homework provides parents with the chance to support their child's progress and engage in dialogue about learning and progress.
- o Homework in Year 7 is delivered in the form of BBL work (Building Better Learners). The focus at Year 7 is to develop students' independent learning skills and they are expected to carry out 15 minutes of independent work for each subject they have studied in that day. BBL strategies are taught to students to provide them with the required skillset to work independently each evening and to develop a routine of self-regulated learning.

How homework will be set:

Teachers will set homework by using the 'Satchel One' online homework app, through which students will be able to check their homework and deadlines. Parents will receive notification when homework is set via the 'Satchel One' app.

Students will never be given a deadline of the day after it is set. Sufficient time will be provided in which students can complete the homework.

The types of homework that we will set and why:

At Bourne Grammar School, we use evidence-informed practice and research in order to provide the most effective types of homework tasks to enhance our students' learning experience.

Homework activity/tasks could include the following:

Time to be Spent Completing Homework or self-directed study:

Based on current good practice and previous DfE guidance, Bourne Grammar School recommends that our students spend the following amount of time on their homework or independent learning.

YEAR 7	Approximately 60 minutes per day	
YEAR 8	Approximately 70 minutes per day	
YEAR 9	Approximately 80 minutes per day	
YEAR 10	Approximately 90 minutes per day	
YEAR 11	Approximately 100 minutes per day	
SIXTH FORM	Approximately 120 minutes per day (excluding study periods)	

If students complete all homework in a time below the School's daily guidance, students should undertake independent learning to consolidate learning or fill in gaps in their knowledge and understanding.

- Year 7 follow a programme of Independent Learning spending 10-15 minutes on homework per night for each subject studied in that day.
- All **Sixth Form** subjects will set approximately 300 minutes of homework per fortnight for each subject studied. Some form of task will be set at the end of every 6th Form lesson for students to complete outside of the classroom: tasks may include independent activities such as research, wider reading or watching a video and may not necessarily require teacher marking or feedback. All tasks will be recorded on Satchel One.

The guidance above is simply that – guidance. Teachers will adhere to the timings as closely as possible but this will not always be possible, particularly in practical subjects.
