This week has been a hive of activity with chess, debating and a large science trip all taking centre stage. Chess continues to thrive at BGS, though on this occasion unfortunately our 'B' side was well beaten by King's Grantham and have been knocked out of the national competition. Meanwhile our Year 12 Debating Team enjoyed a wonderful evening at the Round 2 Regional stages held at Stamford School and Mr Mitchell reports that they gave an excellent account of themselves. They too were not successful on this occasion, though our two Debating Societies are on a steep upwards curve in terms of performance and I am sure our four competitors will be better for the experience. The Science Trip to Warwick University for 67 students was also a first-class experience, with themes ranging from the cloning of extinct dinosaurs from fossilised droppings or nail clippings, to an understanding of the importance of Ocean Physics when studying the Battle of Actium in 31BC. All in all, a wonderful week of additional opportunity and learning on top of the usual flow of Sports practices/fixtures and Performing Arts rehearsals.

While celebrating levels of participation in a range of wider activities, we are delighted to be sharing in the celebration of our successful Oxbridge candidates this year. In addition to three students already holding offers to study at Oxford, we were informed this week of a further five who have been successful in receiving offers from Cambridge. James Pembury, Luca Harrison, Maddy Gamble, Charlotte Alder and David Hyam (all Cambridge) join Catie Dawson, Elijah Ford and Charlie Knight (all Oxford) in a longer list of academic Oxbridge success than we have had in many years. All eight deserve huge congratulations for their efforts and I would like to thank Mrs Elliot for her work in supporting them through the tough application process. There are also a further nine candidates who were interviewed but did not get offers. To those nine, do not dwell on this disappointment. Use it instead to spur you on to even greater achievements in the years ahead. One disappointment does not define your future.

Finally, a plea to all parents who drop off/pick up at the beginning/end of the day, especially if you choose to do so in residential areas. My advice continues to be that the best place to do this is in the Tesco car park. It is not a long walk for students, and there are suitable road crossings between here and the car park that help ensure the safety of that route. We have received a complaint from a local resident with accompanying photographs evidencing that cars are blocking pavements and driveways when waiting to pick up and potentially also blocking access to emergency service vehicles. It is very important to us that, as a community school, we maintain strong and positive relationships with our neighbours. Therefore, please can I ask that any parent dropping off or picking up considers carefully where and how their vehicles are parked. These issues disappear if residential streets are avoided.

DEBATING COMPETITION - Report by Harrison Smith, Year 12

Following success in the first round of the prestigious English-Speaking Union's (ESU) School Mace Debating competition in November, the Bourne Grammar School's Debating Team competed in round two this week.

Speaking for Bourne Grammar were Josh Barrett, Connie Bayliss and Harrison Smith, supported by Rhys Evans, who helped with research and planning. The motion was 'This House believes that schools should focus on maximising students' value to the modern workplace over a broad and balanced education" and Bourne Grammar were tasked with opposing the motion. Speaking for the motion was Loughborough Grammar School, an incredibly strong team.

Once again, the ESU appointed judges scored both teams on four key communication skill sets: reasoning and evidence; organisation and prioritisation; listening and response; and expression and delivery.

In what turned out to be a very close competition, Bourne Grammar were narrowly pipped at the post for a place in the next round, however it was an enjoyable and fast-moving debate, and the team received some excellent feedback. The judges recognised our robust response to Loughborough's opening, their ability to think on their feet, and their eloquent handling of audience questions.

The team left the competition feeling proud of their performance. They are now looking forward to using the debating



skills they honed in the competition in internal school debates. Thank you to Mr Mitchell and Ms Creedon for their support throughout the competition.
