Our Cambridge trip to Christ's college was one very remarkable and educational experience. A group of Year 11s were afforded the privilege to visit the renowned university. The day began with a 1.5hr coach ride, with everyone being eager and awaiting to reach the destination of the 15th century building.

As we arrived, we were pleased to see that the weather was on our side and we were greeted by an enthusiastic tour guide, lightening up everyone's mood as we walked our way to the site.

Upon reaching, we swiftly made our way to a lecture room where Ellie from the College guided us through informative discussions about post-16 options, A-level choices, and specifically, insights into Cambridge University. Additionally, we discovered the vibrant club and societies at the university, where we learned

about the various associations and how there's something for everyone (we were even told that there was a Taylor Swift association for the Swifties out there). Nonetheless, the session proved to be an educational and valuable experience, shedding light on our potential future paths in education.

Soon after, we were pleasantly surprised to encounter Jess, a former student from our school, who kindly and passionately provided us with a comprehensive tour and helped us form a greater understanding into the area's history - and legends... Moreover, we learned that this university holds the legacy of renowned figures like Charles Darwin, with a dedicated garden showcasing his findings. The richness of history continued to deepen as Jess guided us further into the campus. For example, Christ's College Chapel, established by Margaret Beaufort, takes an intriguing turn as she, the founder, was unable to enter due to the stereotypes of the times and resorted to observing it from a window. Opposite this were exquisite stained-glass windows that contribute to its architectural beauty.



We then followed this with a delicious lunch served by the university and we headed to a Q&A session with an international law student and a classics student, who were currently studying at Cambridge. Everyone displayed a keen enthusiasm, asking a series of insightful questions about student life. And we were all delighted to be offered the insiders' perspectives.

The Cult of Beauty at the Wellcome Collection enabled students to see a range of objects and art from past and present regarding pressures people face to improve their appearance.



Women in Revolt at the Tate Britain empowered many of our students and brought to light the struggles women have faced over the past 50 years in Art and society.

Finally, the Taylor Wessing Photography Prize at the National Portrait Gallery gave an insight into human connection, anthropology and loss. All of the exhibitions visited enabled students to see art first

HOUSE MATHS CHALLENGE – Report by Mr Flight and House Leaders

Students from Years 7 – 12 have been taking part in the House Maths Challenge, with forms competing against each other to answer as many questions as possible and win vital points for their House. The challenge is designed to test and encourage their mathematical reasoning and precision of thought and logic skills.

Tutor groups were split into 8 teams of 4 and took on 15 questions covering a range of mathematical skills. Each team answered 15 multiple choice questions, each one giving 1 mark for a correct answer, for a combined total of 120 points for each form. All points from each House were added together to give a total and go towards the ever-competitive House Championship.

A huge congratulations to all those involved, and it has been fantastic to hear all the positive comments from tutors regarding the enthusiastic participation across all year groups.

Last week, the school took a small number of teams down to the King Henry VIII relays in Coventry. This is a unique race in the calendar as the teams can be selected from any school year and indeed, we took a mix of students from Year 13 to Year 7. For many of the Year 13 students this marked their last race representing the school and it was good to have many of the regulars from over the last few years of cross country namely: Hannah Taylor, Erin Cox, Ben Simpson, Owen James and Seb Beedell.

The race is also unique in the sense that the course only had one small section of woodland and the rest was on tarmac, so it did allow for some quick times over the 2.3-mile course. Of the boys' team there were two particularly standout runners in Thomas Preston and Seb Beedell who managed times of 10:25 and 10:30 respectively which were the 4th and 5th fastest leg times of the race. Likewise, to highlight a couple of the members of the girls' teams, Yvette Annis finished with a Top 20 leg time and Sophie Alliston in Year 7 finished with the 25th fastest time of the day, particularly impressive given her age. Our best performance overall came from the team of Yvette, Hannah, Erin and Charlotte Smith who ran fantastically to finish 10th as a team.

LAW DEPARTMENT UPDATES - Mr Mitchell, Law



The Law department recently held its traditional Mock Crown Court trials, following a talk from Crown Prosecution Service Barrister Qamar Iqbal and a session on the skill of advocacy in the criminal courts.

We are very grateful for Qamar’s willingness to give his time and expertise for the benefit of BGS students.

The students worked on a trial in which the defendant was accused of committing Assault Occasioning Actual Bodily Harm, contrary to s.47 of the Offences Against the Person Act 1861, while attending a school disco!

I was very impressed by the quality of advocacy on display – great potential for a future at the Bar - and also the commitment shown by students with other roles in the trial, such as the witnesses, court clerks, ushers, jury forepersons, court reporters and judicial assistants. The remaining students in each group acted as jurors, and of course their verdicts were crucial to this process: in 12B, the verdict was “guilty”; in 12C, the verdict was “not guilty”. Every Law student was involved in some way in these mock trials.

In addition to these events, BGS Law students have secured work experience with local law firms, some students have judicial work shadowing at a local Crown Court, many students have university offers for Law, and the Law department supported those applying for Jurisprudence/Law at Oxford and Cambridge, of which three students received offers.

In Term 4, we look forward to a talk from a High Court Judge, and we are once again hoping to host an international sports lawyer and a panel of solicitors for the students later in the year.

The Year 12 students are currently working very hard on the Criminal Law topics for Paper 1, with Paper 2 on the Law of Tort to follow.

The Year 13 students are also working with effort and determination to complete Paper 3A on Contract Law, while also developing their revision of the whole course as the summer finals appear on the horizon. 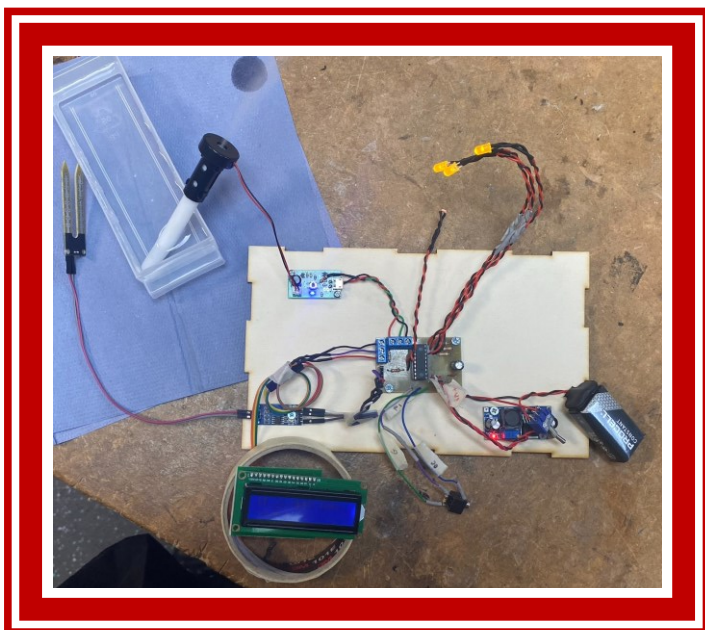
BBL CHAMPION AWARD – Mr Hewitt, Deputy Headteacher – Academic

Sophie Brown in 13I is this week's BBL Champion for some outstanding independent work in Design Engineering. For her A-Level coursework project, Sophie is producing an automated system to grow delicate plants which includes a soil moisture sensing probe that controls an ultrasonic misting system for gentle watering as well as grow-lights that automatically turn themselves off through the day to save energy. She has also integrated an LCD display that provides real-time updates to the user, all controlled by a microcontroller chip she wrote the software for; the project is enclosed in a 3D-printed housing that she designed herself.

Students are encouraged to work on their coursework projects outside of lessons throughout the course - Sophie's persistent effort and wise use of her time at home over a sustained period have seen her produce a high-quality portfolio showcasing both her design skills and impressive practical ability. Very well done, Sophie.
