I began my annual series of visits to local primary schools this week, discussing how to approach the 11+ process and the steps by which a prospective student and their family can join our community. As ever, I was warmly welcomed in particular by Year 5 students keen to ask questions about the School, and to tell me how much they would like to join BGS. I fronted questions about clubs, uniform, sports fixtures, trips and even network security! Questions around the content of the core Key Stage 3 curriculum were limited, and it brought home to me the importance of providing the kind of educational breadth and experience that excites young people in a way that the core academic curriculum will always struggle to match. I told them proudly of our achievements in sport, of our recent West End Wonders show and forthcoming run of High School Musical performances, of our success in Art as part of the recent Rotary Club competitions, and of trips to Spain and Austria and Wales in addition to more local hubs such as Nottingham and London. Most importantly I described for them the positive and happy atmosphere that surrounds our school and the range of experiences both in and out of the classroom that we are keen to provide. A fortnight ago, on National Offer Day, the next cohort of Year 7 students was given the happy news that they have a place at BGS in September, and at the same time I was informed that our waiting list sits, once again, at over 100. We are a School in demand because of the quality of the educational experience we provide, and we should be collectively proud of what is achieved on a daily basis at our School.

However, we must not downplay the importance of the academic bedrock without which our young people could not move on successfully to life beyond school, and the narrative here is equally impressive. On top of 8 Oxbridge offers this year we now also have a confirmed 7 offers to study Medicine and 155 students with confirmed university offers while we await the final tranche of university decisions to complete the university application process. You will have read last week about the fabulous achievements of our Physics students in the Olympiad, and our analysis of mock examination results recently completed at Year 11 and 13 suggests a very fine set of results await in August. As well as providing breadth we provide enormous academic depth, something we are also very proud of.

Finally, good luck to the cast, crew and staff directors of High School Musical. A final weekend of rehearsals awaits followed by a performance to local Year 6 students and a run of 5 performances to parents, students and friends of the School. It is sure to be another wonderful week for the Performing Arts!

CAREERS WEEK – Mrs Elliot, UCAS and Careers

It has been a busy time this week in School during National Careers Week. As well as seeing how their school subjects link to careers, students have welcomed into School a range of different employers who have shone a spotlight on different industry sectors and the opportunities available. On Monday Year 11 had a talk from the Department for Work and Pensions on using social media effectively in the work place, and on Tuesday Barratt homes came in to talk to the Year 7s about all the different roles that are involved in building a house; from buying the land to its new owners moving in.

On Wednesday it was the turn of our year 10s when Lincolnshire Talent Academy presented the 350 different roles available in the NHS, from medical physicist to dental technician to art therapist.

On Thursday, Anglian Water came in to work with our Year 8s on the Water Challenge; planning, building and testing a water system, and thinking about the job roles that are involved along the way.



Freddie Neal writes: Last week Anglian Water came into School for National Careers Week to educate Year 8 on the certain qualities that are needed to work in the industry and to have great fun in the process. Year 8 had to work together in teams of four to five to try and construct a cost-efficient pipe network to transport water across a map and into different customers' homes. It was a very wet but amazing experience which linked in with the current Year 8 Geography topic of water scarcity. It involved teamwork and demonstrated how companies such as Anglian Water are solving problems and what working there might be like for a year 8 in the future someday. I personally found the day a really interesting experience as it highlighted to me the value of teamwork in areas both outside of school and in a potential future workplace.

Finally, and by no means least, Friday was International Women's Day and Katie Pogan, an engineer from Caterpillar in Peterborough, came in to talk to Year 9 students about the opportunities available in engineering - thank you also to year 13 Sophia Leaton and the sixth form girls who put together a fantastic video conveying their enthusiasm for engineering and STEM subjects. 
