ANTHONY NOLAN TRUST – Report by Mrs Lattimer, Head of Year 12

Year 12 follow a varied and interesting programme of weekly lectures. Last term, a volunteer from The Anthony Nolan Trust spoke to students about his experience of donating his stem cells, several years after opting to join the Stem Cell Register when he was only 17.



Anthony Nolan saves and improves the lives of people with blood cancer and blood disorders in three main ways. They make lifesaving connections between patients and incredible strangers who are ready to donate their stem cells. They also fund ground-breaking research as well as aiming to provide the best experience for every patient before, during and after transplant.

Sadly, every 14 minutes someone in the UK is diagnosed with a blood cancer. A stem cell transplant from a stranger can be their only hope.

Many students were inspired and were eager to have the opportunity to “Help Save a Life”. This week, all Sixth Formers and younger members of staff had the opportunity in school to sign up to the Stem Cell register. We are pleased that 88 students swabbed their cheeks in the Sixth Form Centre on Wednesday afternoon in order to join the national database. They will remain on the register for life.

The students have a few months to continue with their volunteering, physical, and skills sections before heading to the Lake District in July for their Gold Qualifying Expedition.



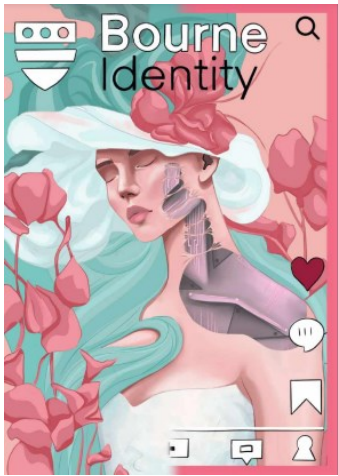
DOFE SILVER PRACTICE EXPEDITION – RUTLAND – FRIDAY 5 APRIL TO SUNDAY 7 APRIL

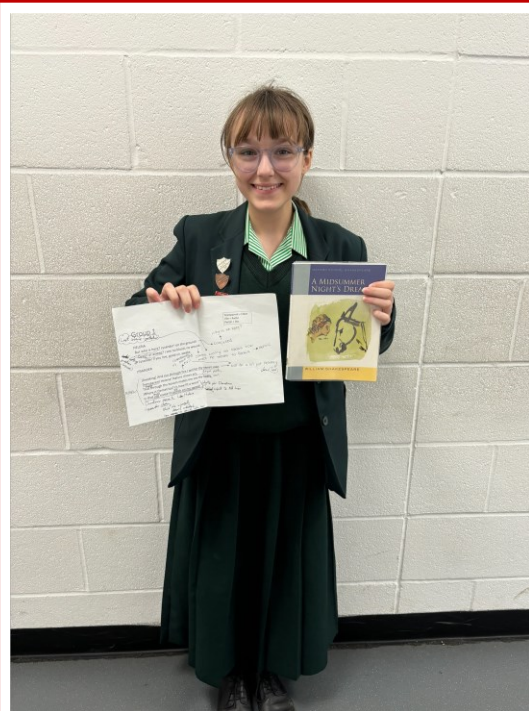
BBL CHAMPION AWARD – Mr Hewitt, Deputy Headteacher – Academic
