England Athletics Open U20/U17/U15 Indoor Championships

Lawson Capes (Lewis Capes, Peterborough and Nene Valley) effectively ended the shot competition with his very first throw. His 17.01 established a commanding lead and allowed him to give it his all with a later throw. He did just that, reaching 17.60 in the third round and then a very impressive 18.59 for a PB and the third furthest of all-time, one round later.

Continuing on the big numbers theme, that throw was the best in Europe and also Capes's seventh national title meaning he now has seven Lenny the Lion mascots in his display cabinet at home – a pride in every sense.
